# ACH and JLFW: **Eight Years of Partnership**

ACH Child and Family Services (ACH) and the Junior League of Fort Worth (JLFW) are entering their eighth year of partnership, and League volunteers are excited to continue serving ACH's families to foster safety, hope, and love.

ACH Child and Family Services provides a range of services aimed at assisting children, youth, and families in overcoming various life challenges. These challenges encompass a wide spectrum, including, but not limited to, issues such as death, divorce, physical and mental illnesses, addiction, homelessness, abuse, and juvenile offenses. ACH's comprehensive services include crisis intervention, foster care, adoption, family support, residential programs, and community-based care, all designed to

address the diverse needs of individuals and families facing these difficulties.

JLFW members will serve in the Robert and Jane Ferguson Residential Treatment Center (RTC) to support foster youth with behavioral and mental health challenges. Established in 2019, the RTC is the only one of its kind in Texas. Teens who suffer from neglect, trauma, abuse, and loss receive healing support through ACH Child and Family Services' skilled treatment teams.

On Tuesday nights from September through May, League volunteers will engage in games, gardening, crafting, and themed nights to create joy for those in treatment. Allison Davis, ACH Project Development Chair, and her team are eager to begin serving in their roles. "Our group is really excited to meet the teenagers, build relationships, and make positive memories." Members will also focus on creating a yearbook to document events and memories from the year.

Join us in wishing Erin Rodriguez, Jewel St. Louis, Kendall Shirey, and Allison **Davis** a wonderful year as they find joy in their service to ACH.

# 50 Years of Mayfest Fun

HIS YEAR, MAYFEST celebrated 50 years of being the "biggest party in Fort Worth." At its core, Mayfest is everything people love about Fort Worth: local musicians; home-grown business owners selling their products; food trucks with diverse cuisine; and families enjoying time together. The four-day event happens in Trinity Park each year.

Since its inception, Trinity Collaborative Inc., the 501(c)(3) that produces Mayfest, has contributed more than \$7.5 million into the Fort Worth community. Originally a collaboration between the Junior League of Fort Worth (JLFW), Streams and Valleys, the City of Fort Worth, and the Tarrant Regional Water District, Mayfest began in 1973 as a way to celebrate the revitalization of the Trinity River and surrounding parks after a devastating flood in 1949.

This year's festival dazzled with seven stages, more than 150 tents, and 135 vendors, all spanning 33 acres. While Mayfest is beautifully planned and executed by Trinity Collaborative, Inc., it's the volunteers who make a difference during the event, and JLFW Members have been there since the very beginning.

Despite the heat, JLFW volunteers showed up and helped however they could to make the event a success.

The MINTS program will serve seven FWISD campuses this year, a major increase from just two in 2013. These include: Atwood McDonald Elementary School, Daggett Middle School, DeZavala Elementary School, Eastern Hills Elementary School, Maudrie M. Walton Elementary School, Western Hills Elementary School, and Young Women's Leadership Academy (YWLA).

Lesley is passionate about the MINTS program because, "Without our volunteers and MINTS budget, many of these schools would go without the things that make school pretty and memorable – fun bulletin boards and murals, family events such as father-daughter dances, author visits, and field trips." Thanks to volunteers, chaperones for these events can be coordinated when parents are unable to make it.

Last year, Provisionals updated the mural in Atwood McDonald Elementary's gym. The school underwent a mascot change nine years ago, and the mural needed a refresh. Over the summer, Monica Grace, Junior MINTS School Coordinator, met with the principal and sketched out a rough draft of what the project would look like. Through the hard work of MINTS volunteers, the space was transformed and will have a lasting impact on the school building.
