



All aBoard

All aBoard is the Junior League of Fort Worth's (JLFW) yearlong leadership development program, designed in conjunction with the JLFW's mission of "developing the potential of women." The program is meant for women in the League that have a passion for serving and want to pursue leadership positions in the League and in the Fort Worth community. Throughout the program, members learn about goal setting, public speaking, general leadership skills as well as governance, and advocacy and finance for nonprofits. Additionally, this year's cohort participated in the BoardBuild training program, which trains emerging



leaders to serve on nonprofit boards and helps pair board candidates with nonprofit organizations. The cohort is split up into small groups. Each group has the advantage of being paired with a Sustainer that serves as a mentor to the small group. The Sustainer serves an important role in sharing learning and wisdom as well as continuing to build upon the investment that the League is making in its members as they go through the All aBoard program.

Training

balance of virtual and in-person trainings were offered throughout the year to promote personal education, fulfillment, development, community awareness, and member interaction. These trainings were designed to develop skills that will benefit members within the League and also in their work and family lives. Natalie Bowen and Janie Latimer served as the Training Co-Chairs. The Training Committee planned more than 40 trainings throughout the year, serving 620+ members, which equals to 1,400+ training hours. Some of the training topics included learning more about the Junior League of Fort Worth, diversity and inclusion, local nonprofit organizations, leadership, health and wellness, parenting, community resources, financial planning, and many more.

ILFW's "MINTS" stands for Mentoring, Inspiring, Nurturing, Tutoring, and Supporting. Each year we are able to provide valuable support to the dedicated teachers in the classroom, the students through mentoring, the families by facilitating educational nights, and supplementing much needed supplies and uniforms. Schools supported included a library project at De Zavala Elementary School, helping make in-person learning fun through decorations and creating a food pantry with Tarrant Area Food Bank (TAFB) at Eastern Hills Elementary School, launching a monthly kindness campaign at Western Hills Elementary and Western Hills Primary, establishing a food pantry program in partnership with TAFB at Maudrie M. Walton Elementary School and hosting the 3 Pillars Conference at Young Women's Leadership Academy.

The JLFW's Community Opportunities Fund (COF) is a resource set up by the League each year to aid local nonprofits as they deal with unbudgeted or unplanned expenses, as well as support a limited number of sponsorships. \$55,500 was distributed during this fiscal year. Funds distributed were used to repair the air conditioning at the house the Junior League built for ODWIN, repair playground equipment, purchase car seats for children in the foster care system, purchase bedding supplies for homeless shelters, and to support local families affected by the formula crisis.

Little Leaguers



ILFW has a new program that introduces children to volunteering and the League, called Little Leaguers. This program was developed by ILFW President Elizabeth Knuckley, and is open to all members and children of all ages. Member's children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews and neighbors are all welcome to participate in the program.

The goal of Little Leaguers is to share the Junior League of Fort Worth's commitment to voluntarism and community improvement. The program is also a way to improve children's social skills, develop a sense of community, teach the power of gratitude and empathy and allows the member and child to bond while giving back to the community. The Little Leaguers program is comprised of three components; donations, service and education. Donations are collected prior to the event, and during the event children are able to participate in volunteering as well as learn about the agency partner and their impact on the Fort Worth community.

In its inaugural year, Little Leaguers served The Welman Project, the JLFW Diaper Bank, the Ronald McDonald House, Meals on Wheels, ACH Child and Family Services, Community Storehouse and Unbound. They have improved our community by donating almost 4,500 diapers, filling 100 reusable bags for new teachers, tying 30 fleece blankets, bringing toys and gifts for a "Christmas House" at Community Store house, creating 40 bags for the women and children served at Unbound, and participated in the Trinity Park Trash Clean-up.
