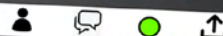
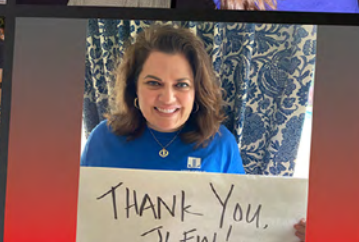

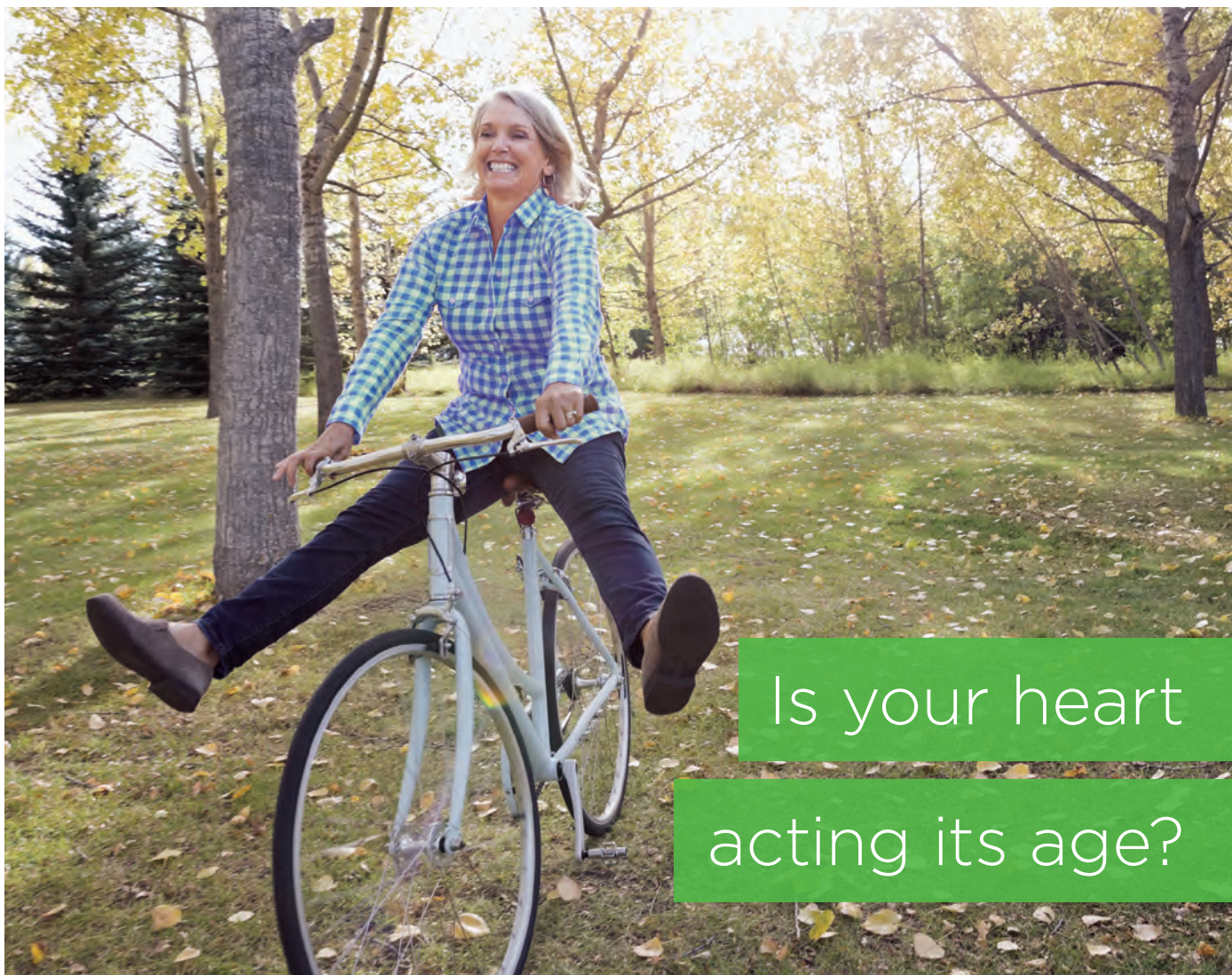

President's Perspective

I love a good catch phrase or repeated expression.

There's something about the power of words to inspire, summarize and challenge. So when I thought about the theme for the Junior League of Fort Worth's 90th year, it's no secret that I loved the energy and excitement of **Spark Possibility**. It was perfect for 2019-2020, as we recognized and remembered our past as well as looked to the future.

How well the League has embraced it this year—both before and now during the current pandemic. You are those who spark, inspire and engage to just plain get it done! We've served within the community, put on fundraisers, led community initiatives and more. All done by a volunteer army of sorts, and all done with the motivation of making things better where we are and where we live.

Typically, the final edition of *The Lariat* summarizes the work done in the home stretch of the League year, from February until May. As you know, all our events past mid-March were halted to protect our community and support Stay at Home orders. It was the way we could spark immediate change in personal interaction and it, no doubt, was a hard but helpful decision.

What I hope has also happened this year is the spark of possibility within yourself and the things you love to do. The League, like no other community organization, pushes us to give and improve our own capabilities and strengths. Sometimes the placement is a perfect fit, one in which we immediately thrive. Yet sometimes it is one that causes us to evaluate where we look to serve differently in the future. (Ask me about my blanket sewing placement for a hospital NICU during my young League years; I learned much!) All of it leads to growth.

Within the contents of this issue you'll learn more about the work done by League members and staff to assist with the COVID-19 crisis and fallout in our community. We've been able to give nearly \$90,000 (all raised by you in previous League years) to community nonprofits serving those in crisis, and we'll have given away nearly 100,000 diapers (from your donations and from the soon-to-open JLFW Diaper Bank planned budget) by this summer.

I'd love to also take a moment to shine a light on other incredible work being done by groups to spark change and internal improvements within the JLFW. Over the course of this year we have written the new 2020-2023 Strategic Plan, updated the Project Research & Development (PR&D) application process, launched an Agency Portal for nonprofits to better interact with the League online, addressed finance and operations procedures, formed a new legal advisory group to advise the President, improved how we will be able to communicate with members in the future and moved meetings to virtual options successfully.

Thank you to each member, Team Leader, Project Development Chair, Committee Chair, Council leader and Advisor who has led this year. And, special thank you to the 2019-2020 Board of Directors, my Sustaining Advisor Paige Pate and my Assistant to the Board of Directors Laura Mitchell. You've all done well and have my utmost appreciation. You are the spark I hoped for.

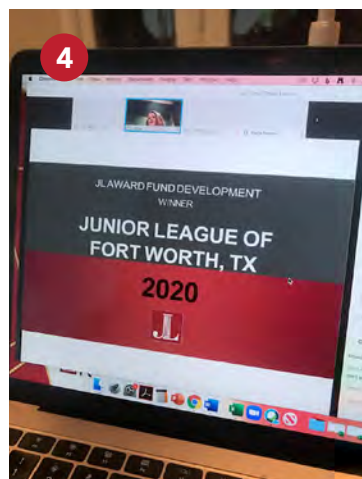
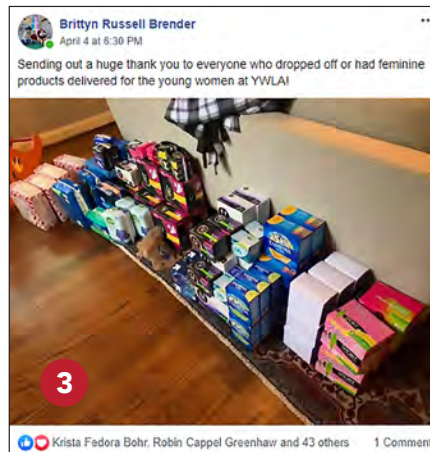

The Cliburn's Successful Shift to a Digital Connection

THE JUNIOR LEAGUE of Fort Worth (JLFW) has had a close relationship with The Cliburn since its origins in the 1970s, and this year has been no different as far as League enthusiasm is concerned! What was different in 2020 was the necessary shift, beginning in March of this year, to a digital roll out of events and a delay of the 2020 Cliburn Amateur Competition as the organization responded to the changing landscape wrought by COVID-19.

As JLFW Sustainer and The Cliburn Director of Events and Donor Relations **Kay Howell** explains, the launch of “Cliburn at Home” allowed for the community to stay connected to both The Cliburn’s music and mission.

Right before The Cliburn moved online, many JLFW members had already begun their placements preparing to help host The Cliburn Amateur competition, helping with welcome bags and more. In fact, much of a JLFW member’s



volunteer time is spent helping with guests and competitors during the actual competition, a truly concentrated placement.

Mary E. Van Meter shares “I had such a wonderful time helping the Cliburn staff source merchandise for the Amateur Competition Gift Shop. We had fun thinking about the unique demographic of the competitors that are amazing pianists but also have other careers. We had fun merchandise and piano themed gifts for those with children, those who were also professionals and even for the music lover who also likes to cook and entertain.”

Project Development Chair **Lauren Team** notes “The Cliburn placement draws members year after year for many reasons. It’s a mission and placement that is beloved to Fort Worth and an honor to

consider being part of something that brings world-class talent to Fort Worth and to the world from Fort Worth. Kay Howell is inspirational and encouraging. I believe that our League’s volunteers learn much about leadership in working with her and the Cliburn. And that’s a true gift The Cliburn gives back to the Junior League in creating an opportunity for our talents to be fostered, encouraged, showcased and grown.”

Anne Hill echoes this sentiment saying, “This is an incredible opportunity the League has to partner with this amazing organization that truly puts Fort Worth on the map internationally in the piano world. As a former member of the League, Kay Howell works well with volunteers to not only make their volunteer hours worthwhile but also integrates volunteers into The Cliburn family by inviting us to events prior to the competition “

While this season found itself abruptly limited in its face-to-face interaction, Howell knows the partnership will remain strong even through the distancing. She agrees that “over the past 50 years, The Cliburn has been fortunate to receive extraordinary support from the Junior League of Fort Worth. Many women who were originally introduced to the Cliburn through their placements continue to volunteer with the organization today. Truly, the Junior League and its members have allowed the Cliburn to thrive while also fulfilling its mission.”

ACH CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES

For more than 100 years, ACH Child and Family Services has sought to prevent child abuse, neglect and family separation, and help heal and treat children already affected by these tragedies. ACH currently offers fifteen residential and community-based services for youth, including counseling, therapeutic residential and respite interventions, foster care and adoption.

In 2014, the Junior League of Fort Worth worked with ACH to create a Wellness Program in the Youth Emergency Shelter, developing education classes and learning experiences for the residents. With the help of the League, ACH has expanded the project to include access to and interaction with arts and culture in 2019-2020.

JLFW Wraps Up Year Serving ACH Child and Family Services

WHILE THE 2019-2020 JUNIOR LEAGUE OF FORT WORTH (JLFW) year has wrapped up differently than anyone could have anticipated, League volunteers accomplished much that has not yet been celebrated in the pages of *The Lariat*. One example is the League's work with ACH Child and Family Services (ACH). This year the JLFW helped craft meaningful educational experiences through a 2019-2020 League Project.

Project Development Chair **Hilary Gray** kindly shared a few of her favorite events throughout the year prior to the end of the year due to COVID-19:

- Payton Birlew, M.S., FLE, and a certified facilitator with Have and to Hold: Family Life Education, was brought in by the League to discuss love languages and help students understand how individuals give and receive love. **Ximena Antunez de Mayolo** did a fantastic job leading this session, receiving rave reviews from the staff and students.
- Volunteers also hosted a grocery store challenge where the children received gift cards and participated in a competition to be the fastest, healthiest or thriftiest shopper. **Ashley Stone** co-led the session with the aim of providing education on developing a healthy grocery store shopping list for the week on a budget.
- **Farrell Boone** set up a visit from The Little Art Bus to provide a creative night of fun. Participants were able to design glitter tattoos and decorate tote bags while enjoying relaxed time in each other's company.

While COVID-19 put an unexpected halt to in-person meetings, volunteers rallied and adjusted creatively with final sessions. **Courtney Wagenseller** recorded videos on Marco Polo for the kids involved in the Life Project to encourage practicing mindfulness and reflection in their journals. They provided a creative outlet and kept kids positive and engaged during the beginnings of the pandemic.

Gray shares, "This is the second time I have had a placement at ACH...I always left the sessions better than when I walked in. The kids are so grateful for the quality time we spend with them. One of the things that ACH told us during our orientation was that the main thing the kids need is consistency."

Throughout the year, in person or digitally, it was this consistency that JLFW members helped to provide.

Sustainer Glenn Whipple's JLFW Family Ties to Our Founding Years

AS THE JUNIOR LEAGUE of Fort Worth (JLFW) year winds down, the League reflects on its 90th year--one of steadfast support for Fort Worth's vibrant community.

It may come as a surprise to learn that the JLFW began in a national crisis. Just months before the Great Depression in 1929, the Junior League of Fort Worth was established and spurred forward by its charter members at a moment when Fort Worth needed it most. These women's legacy has lived on not only in the work of the JLFW but also in the spirit of voluntarism that has been passed along in their families and friends.

Glenn Whipple understands that legacy well, being the daughter of **Josephine Shannon**, one of the JLFW's 10 charter members. For Whipple, serving the community was a value instilled in her early on in her life. In a recent interview with the JLFW, Whipple shared that Shannon had served as a nurse's aid in

World War II before helping found the JLFW. Whipple herself began volunteering as early as 13 or 14 at the Fort Worth Museum of Science and History, then called the Fort Worth Children's Museum.

Mothers and daughters often share great League stories and experiences. While Shannon loved theatrics and also founded the Purple Hearters, a group responsible for light hearted entertainment and theatrical offerings at General Membership Meetings, Whipple took a more clerical approach to her League service. She worked in accounting for most of her life. She did share a common love of leadership and followed in her mother's presidential footsteps. Shannon served as President from 1943 to 1944, and Whipple took the helm more than 30 years later, serving from 1974-1975. During Whipple's term, she oversaw development of important community projects such as Mayfest and The Cliburn International Competition,

which both remain an integral piece of the Fort Worth community to this day.

While Shannon is no longer alive to interview, Whipple recalls bringing in speakers to General Membership Meetings who covered everything from homemaking to the Equal Rights Amendment to behavioral sciences. However, she states that she most appreciated the "personal development the League provided," and the proud sense of accomplishment that was inspired by the team around her. "I was always someone who wanted to do things myself, but the League helped me learn to trust others and delegate," Whipple notes. "It was amazing to see the growth of the women around me on the Board."

This sentiment is best summed up in a closing letter that Whipple offered to members in the May 1975 edition of the *Corral* (the JLFW's predecessor publication to *The Lariat*) at the close of her presidential term and it resonates today at the close of an extraordinary 2019-2020 year.



"A LOVE LETTER TO ALL OF YOU FROM ALL OF ME"

By Glenn Whipple, President, 1974-1975

Never in my wildest dreams could I have imagined such a beautiful year as you have given me! Each of you has had a part in the League's history this year and I hope you are as proud of your accomplishments as I am.

My greatest joy has been knowing you, watching you think and work and solve problems, listening to your great ideas, enthusiasm and concern for the LEAGUE - where it's at and where it's going. You care, and because you care, you count! And you will continue to "make things happen," because you do care.
