Paint a Playground

PAIN'T A PLAYGROUND is the newest partnership between the Junior League of Fort Worth (JLFW) and Fort Worth Independent School District (FWISD). This new placement gives students exciting, colorful spaces to have fun, stay fit and build community on campus.

Paint a Playground Co-Chair **Lindsey Tiekens** said the committee was busy planning during the Fall semester in collaboration with FWISD and school principals. “We visited schools, scouted playgrounds and mapped the stencils,” she said.

The first school playground to be painted was Atwood McDonald, on March 25, 2023. On Friday, April 14, a ribbon cutting was held as students anxiously ran into the new play space through a colorful breakaway banner to cheers from FWISD and JLFW partners.

“The mission of Paint a Playground is to create a bright and welcoming environment for students to play in which not only engages their bodies in activity but also their minds with mental stimulation as well,” said **Lizzy Chapman**, Vice President of Communications for the JLFW.

For all partnering schools, the committee will paint recess classics such as Hopscotch, Tic Tac Toe, Four Square, instructional aids such as maps and the solar system, as well as social emotional learning tools such as yoga poses, affirmations, and sensory pathways. Each school also receives a cart full of balls, bean bags, and jump ropes to compliment the paintings.

These colorful, painted spaces will be used for years to come to encourage active play to benefit students’ physical, emotional and mental health. This is one of two FWISD playgrounds that will be painted by JLPW volunteers on a flat top space this spring, and the first of many for the ongoing partnership.

First Tee – Fort Worth Briscoe/Morningside Building and Resource Project

FIRST TEE – FORT WORTH is a placement and a project at Briscoe Elementary School in the Morningside neighborhood this year. First Tee was awarded \$35,000 and has six volunteers from the Junior League of Fort Worth (JLFW). This year’s volunteers included **Savanah Hollowell, Jennifer Cole, Sara Fender, Meredith Andrews, Caitlyn Bastable** and **Hannah Reeb**.

Per Hollowell, Briscoe is a one-of-a-kind school-based practice facility that is located on this Fort Worth ISD elementary school campus. The facility allows students at Briscoe and other surrounding schools and community

centers access to the First Tee program during their physical education classes, after school programs and over the summer. The facility is currently going through technology upgrades and a branding refresh. The changes currently underway include new furniture, a promethean board, a security camera, and Chromebooks for participants to use during classes.

The mission of the newly established “Briscoe Task Force” is to increase awareness, engagement, and support of First Tee – Fort Worth. Through fostering relationships with community leaders, potential donors, volunteers and





Tee members, allowing them access to free golf clubs, free play and practice, caddie day at Colonial Country Club, PGA Jr. League, and, eventually, National opportunities once they are in high school.

The task force was excited to host its Spring Jamboree on March 4, 2023 at Briscoe Elementary School. The event provided a way to kick off the Spring season and encourage community engagement in the program. JLFW members are encouraged to scan the QR Code below to view ways to become involved in First Tee – Fort Worth program.

The mission of the newly established "Briscoe Task Force" is to increase awareness, engagement, and support of First Tee – Fort Worth. Through fostering relationships with community leaders, potential donors, volunteers, and families, the task force seeks to receive the support of all stakeholders.

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Thanks to the Jordan Spieth Family Foundation, First Tee – Fort Worth was able to purchase a 34-passenger bus that allows students from local schools and community centers to have transportation to and from programs at green grass facilities like Rockwood where First Tee is headquartered. FWISD Scholarship Project

ADDRESSING Junior League of Fort Worth (JLFW) impact areas of physical health and mental health, Girls on the Run DFW Metroplex (GOTR DFW) was one of eight projects recommended for the 2022-2023 year by the Project Research and Development (PR&D) Committee.

GOTR DFW is a FWISD Scholarship project that encourages girls to be joyful, healthy and confident by teaching life skills through dynamic, conversation-based lessons and running. GOTR DFW has experience and evidence-based programs that inspires girls to build confidence, kindness and decision-making skills while also learning to recognize and embrace their inner strength. The lessons learned not only instill valuable life skills, but also make the important connection between physical, mental and emotional health.

Through Girls on the Run, JLFW has made a commitment of \$40,000 and seven volunteers. JLFW funding supports scholarships for program participants to ensure the GOTR DFW program is accessible for every girl, without her ever needing to worry about the cost. JLFW funds directly impact the number of elementary and middle school aged girls in FWISD that can participate. JLFW funds may also be used to buy running shoes for program participants.

JLFW volunteers serve as coaches and mentors for a GOTR DFW group. JLFW volunteers join physical activity and dynamic discussions to build social, emotional and physical skills while



encouraging healthy habits for life for these wonderful girls. Each season comes to an end with a celebratory 5K. This closing event gives program participants of all abilities a tangible sense of accomplishment.

Through this project JLFW hopes girls find their confidence and inner strength within to boldly pursue their dreams and maintain good mental and physical health. JLFW looks forward to continuing this partnership with FWISD and making a positive impact for the children in our community for many years to come.

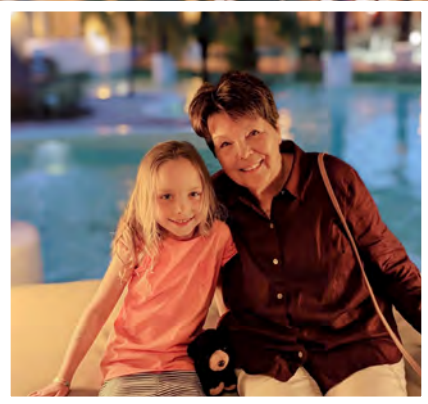

Conversations with Dr. Tara Reed, Diversity & Inclusion Chair

Tara: What does being in Junior League mean to you as an Asian and Pacific Islander woman?

Laurimay: As an Asian American woman raised in Tennessee, my life experiences have provided me unique perspectives on belonging and justice. I strongly believe representation matters, and it is incredibly important to me to be a positive source of validation and support for other Asian Americans in our community. I am extremely grateful to live in a community where the Junior League is present and available for all women who want to serve.

Stephanie: I'm humbled to be a part of an organization that has had such a longstanding history of building solutions and expanding resources in Fort Worth. I hope to contribute to and support the League's legacy while also bringing fresh and diverse perspectives!

Tara: As JLFW reaches 100 years, what do you hope to see more of in terms of leadership, inclusion and community affiliation?

Laurimay: To know where you are going, you need to know where you have been. It would be meaningful to our members, and the greater Fort Worth community, to host an event focused on the history, milestones and timeline of the JLFW.

From there, I would like to see us help create a multi-cultural event, where we can share in food, fellowship and entertainment representative of the myriad cultures and ethnicities of our county.

Stephanie: I'd love to see JLFW be a bastion of belonging for individuals of all walks of life and backgrounds. By allowing service to be our unifying force, I believe the League can continue to empower, connect, and bring together women from all backgrounds under the single mission of making the greatest impact we can on our community.

Tara: What connections do you feel the League needs to make in our local Asian and Pacific Islander community to become more inclusive?

Laurimay: From the 2020 Census, the six largest ethnic groups residing in Tarrant County are Chinese, Filipino, Indian, Vietnamese, Japanese and Korean. Given this, we should first do a landscape analysis of organizations either led by or servicing our Asian and Pacific Islander neighbors. From there, we can then create the best strategy for outreach and catalyzing meaningful connections within the community.

Stephanie: The Asian population is the fastest growing demographic in North Texas according to the most recent Census! It would be wonderful to see the League partner with more local Asian and Pacific Islander non-profits and organizations to expand our footprint to serve more directly in areas with significant Asian and Pacific Islander communities (for example, Haltom City).

The Diversity & Inclusion Committee would like to thank Laurimay Johnson and Stephanie Haley for taking the time to talk with us and share their stories with our members. 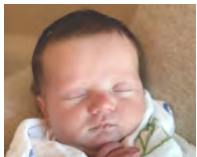

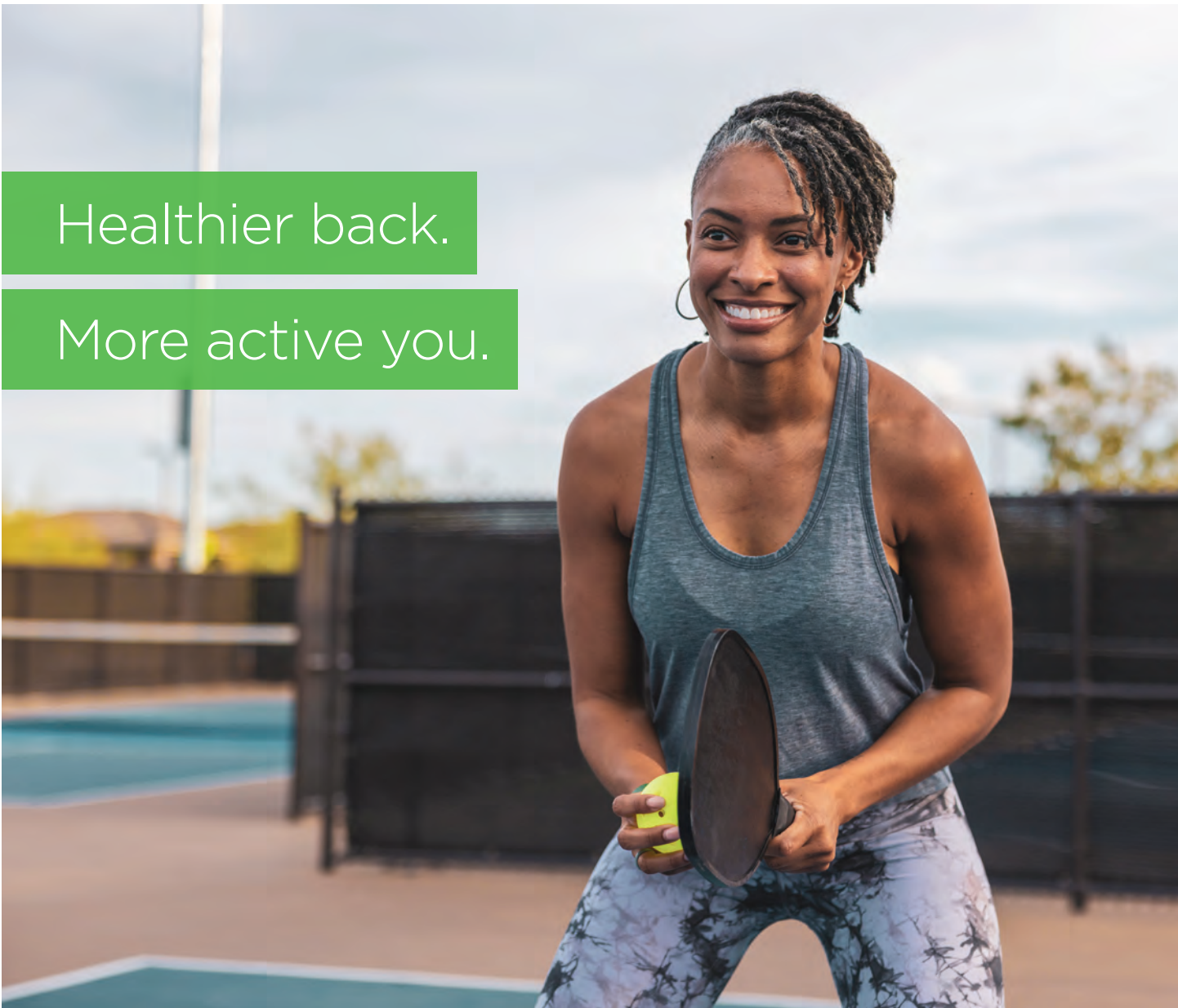
