UMMER DAYS were more fun than usual this year for several SMaRT Camp participants. Thanks to the extraordinary work of Chapel Hill Academy (CHA) teachers and Junior League of Fort Worth (JLFW) volunteers, students received social and academic development through enrichment activities during summer camp.

SMaRT Camp is for 3rd through 8th graders at CHA, a division of Lena Pope. CHA is a Title I School, meaning at least 65 percent of the student population qualifies for a free or reduced breakfast and lunch.

ILFW made a commitment of \$40,000 and six volunteers to Chapel Hill Academy's SMaRT Camp. JLFW funding assists in bus transportation and admission to field trips, as well as curriculum and supplies for SMaRT Camp. This League year, JLFW volunteers accompanied campers on several field trips, including visits to the





Perot Museum, the Dallas Zoo, the Dallas Aquarium and Globe Life Field. JLFW volunteers also helped campers with science experiments and even joined in on an etiquette class.

"Seeing the joy on their face shows you how much of an impact this camp makes," said Project Chair Shannon Quinn.

JLFW believes every child deserves access to an exceptional education that encourages them to grow and learn. SMaRT Camp provides opportunities for children to learn about topics of interest to them, and in turn, increases their overall academic success. In addition, the program aids in preventing summer learning loss. JLFW is proud to partner with Lena Pope and looks forward to continuing this positive partnership for these deserving students.

JLFW Diaper Bank Update

A Desperate Need, Met with a Desire to Help

NE IN THREE American families report experiencing diaper need. In fact, the average household is short 19 diapers per month. More than 18,000 families with children under the age of five are living in poverty in Tarrant County. Aiming to resolve this glaring need, the Junior League of Fort Worth (JLFW) continues to serve as a mobilizer and connector for families and individuals with diaper need in Tarrant County.

JLFW has distributed more than 675,000 diapers since the program's intent was announced in 2019. In addition to filling the need for diapers, the program also distributes wipes and bed pads. In partnership with the Tarrant Area Food Bank, JLFW has been able to get diapers of all sizes, for all ages, into the hands of those needing them most.

In honor of National Diaper Need Awareness Week (September 24 – October 2), a call for diaper donations was met with the generosity of League members and the community. In addition to the average 40,000 diapers Junior League Fort Worth distributes each month, in September, Junior League members collected an additional 43,000 diapers to mark the occasion. This League year alone, JLFW has distributed more than 157,000 diapers.

Led by Co-Chairs Emily Paul and Danielle Dollahite, this year's Diaper Bank committee has taken the initiative a step further by hosting fundraisers and successfully reaching out to local businesses and encouraging their involvement. The Committee even had a children's Sunday School class participate and collect thousands of diapers. With no plans of slowing down, the Junior League of Fort Worth is continuing to close the diaper need gap in our community. HE JUNIOR LEAGUE OF Fort Worth's (JLFW) ongoing partnership with the Daniel Migael Foundation is having a direct impact on communities throughout Fort Worth. The project, All Eyes on ALICE: Keeping 76104 in Focus, is an unbridled success, and our support continues to ripple through communities in need.

ALICE, which stands for Asset Limited Income Constrained Employed, provides a vital need to the 76104 community. The League's continued support means more ALICE clinics will be available to focus on vision needs in the 76104 community. JLFW funding is also helping to maintain PopEye, the bus used as a lab during clinics.

There is a great deal of need for vision assistance in our community, and many clinics see patients who have been referred by friends or family members helped by the Daniel Migael Foundation. Clinics provide complimentary vision checks and prescription eyeglasses to those in need, and the level of direct impact on our community is humbling.



Spotlight at Casa Mañana

HURSDAY EVENINGS are an important time at Casa Mañana Studios, the organization's performing arts school. From 4:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. students in their All-Abilities Class come together to learn about the art of theatre, develop their own talents and rehearse for special performances. This year, a group of volunteers from the Junior League of Fort Worth (JLFW) also join weekly to support these students in their theatrical endeavors.

For more than 25 years, Casa Mañana has offered an All-Abilities Class for youth and adults with disabilities.

These classes, specially designed to develop cognitive skills and encourage socialization, help champion equity in the performing arts world. Additionally, they provide an important artistic and

social outlet for individuals who no longer have access to the support and extra-curricular offerings of the K-12 school system.

The funds associated with this JLFW project enabled Casa Mañana to make their space more accessible. They constructed an ADA-compliant wheelchair ramp into the studio and also created two ADA-compliant restrooms within the footprint of the school. Both improvements better equip Casa Mañana to support their students and their families and caregivers.

The 15 students enrolled in this year's All-Abilities class range in age from high school to late 30's. In the first few weeks of the new class year, they will select their play, participate in auditions, learn choreography, practice lines, and begin

learning a musical number, all with their fall showcase and spring performance in mind. The five League members who serve as volunteers on this project attend class weekly and help provide reminders on blocking, timing, stage directions, line prompting and more.

Janie Latimer, who serves as the Project Development Chair, shared, "You don't have to be a theatre buff to be in this placement. You just have to be able to love on these students and care for them and help them succeed, and I think that shines through to our Junior League Mission."

Latimer also encouraged League members to attend the fall and spring performances put on by the All-Abilities Class to help support the performers and grow community awareness about the program.



Show Life:

Grand Entry Gala and Fort Worth Stock Show & Rodeo Placements

HE FORT WORTH STOCK SHOW and Rodeo (FWSSR) is Fort Worth's most legendary event and the Junior League of Fort Worth kicks it off on January 7, 2023 at Will Rogers Coliseum with the Grand Entry Gala (GEG). GEG Communication Chair, Vivian Bailey, says "this year is one for the books as GEG kicks off the Rodeo season for the 10th year!" The committee was excited to welcome not just one, but three legendary country music artists to the stage - Tracy Byrd, Mark Chesnutt, and Neal McCoy. The 2022 event featured Sara Evans and raised \$293,969 with all proceeds going to further JLFW's Mission.

Additional placements for League members during the FWSSR include the Stock Show Art Contest, which hosts more than 1,800 entries across Texas and is open to children ages 5-18. Youth compete for more than \$80,000 in cash awards and scholarships, with support that stems from volunteer efforts and fundraising from the Stock Show's Guns & Roses Committee along with JLFW.



A special auction will be held at the Grand Entry Gala for the top six entries of the FWSSR Art Contest, which include Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, and first through fourth place high school winners art work. This provides participants with an additional opportunity to obtain increased scholarship funds.

The most iconic example of JLFW's support of FWSSR is our League members "yelling and selling" the Rodeo Souvenir Annual in Dickies Arena for each and every Rodeo performance.







Sales of the Rodeo Souvenir Annual benefit not only FWSSR's scholarship fund, but also the JLFW. Two dollars from each program sold goes back to support JLFW's mission.



New for 2023 is the FWSSR's Pony Up! 50/50 Raffle. Thanks to legislation passed in 2021, professional rodeos are able to join with other professional sports as part of the Professional Sports Team Charitable Foundation Raffle Enabling Act, which is great news for the FWSSR and the many scholarship programs and educational initiatives it funds. The winner of the 50/50 raffle will earn half of the net proceeds raised while the other half is retained for charitable purposes.



"In 2023, League members were invited to apply for paid positions assisting the Show with selling these raffle tickets, but in the future we're hopeful it will be another way JLFW members can support the Rodeo through a new placement opportunity," said Ashley Davis, Special Events & Exhibits Manager for FWSSR and Major Leaguers Co-Chair for JLFW.

Tara: What does being in Junior League mean to you as an African American

Shay: I've been introduced to some great programs and nonprofits through JLFW and I'm better for it. I'd like to think those programs and nonprofits are better too, because I've provided a more diverse lens to their organizations.

Tara: Understanding the potential of the League, progress, inclusion and sisterhood without limitations is why I joined and what keeps me here.

Satoya: I am fortunate to have philanthropic endeavors in many avenues within our community. While I stepped away from a few, I chose to remain in the League due to our longstanding history and great service throughout our community.

Mia: I hope that my participation, advocacy and impact will encourage women of all races and walks of life to seek membership. Our differences are assets, and our contributions of thought and unique life experiences enrich the League and the greater community.

Tara: As JLFW reaches 100 years, what do you hope to see more of in terms of leadership, inclusion and community affiliation?

Shay: My hope for JLFW is to see more women of all races and ethnicities not only join the League, but to serve in leadership roles and to see JLFW participate and co-program with some of the other dynamic women's service organizations such as the four Divine Nine sororities, Links, or Jack and Jill, on a consistent basis.

Tara: JLFW is primed and positioned to collaborate with a diverse group of community organizations in Fort Worth. I hope to see consistency in our growth and willingness to be bold and vocal to promote inclusion, accessibility and belonging in JLFW and the community.

Satoya: With my recent slating as Vice President of Education, a League member shared that representation matters. As I reflected on that as well as similar sentiments that have been shared from various spaces, it is important that we not just strive to serve our community, but also reflect our community when possible.

Mia: I hope that the League will continue to expand their footprint throughout the Fort Worth community, especially those that have historically been marginalized and underserved.

Tara: What connections do you feel the League needs to make in our local African-American community to become more inclusive?

Shay: Certainly, the Black Chamber of Commerce would be a great resource to JLFW to find out how we could better serve, as well as community organizations such as Como Lions Heart or the Glencrest Civic League.

Tara: A great step in growing our connections was with LGBTQ Saves as well as working with our Divine Nine Sororities. We must continue reaching out and not wait for organizations to reach out to us first.

Satoya: I would love for us to build upon and expand on multicultural collaborations throughout our community. I believe it brings an awareness and understanding of other organizations and often times cultures.

Mia: I hope that we will broaden our influence by partnering with the various Chambers of Commerce, women leadership organizations, governmental entities, and nonprofits dedicated to the advancement of our communities most vulnerable and marginalized citizens.


